Topics to Revise:

Unseen Poetry

Key Information:

You will answer two questions.

Question one will ask you to analyse one poem in detail. You should spend 30 minutes on this question Question two will ask you to compare the methods in two poems. You should spend 15 minutes on this question

Tips for Success:

• Remember to keep the assessment criteria in your mind when you are writing your response.

1. Read the Poem Carefully

- Read it twice: first for meaning, second for details.
- Highlight interesting words, phrases, and images.
- Look for tone and mood (how does it feel? Happy? Sad? Angry? Peaceful?).

2. Understand the Poem

- What is it about? (The subject or theme)
- Who is speaking? (The voice or perspective)
- What is the message or feeling? (The poet's purpose)

3. Spot Language Features - AND Their Effects

- Imagery: similes, metaphors, personification What do they make you imagine or feel?
- Sound devices: alliteration, repetition, rhyme Do they create rhythm, emphasis, or mood?
- **Word choices**: powerful adjectives, verbs, unusual phrases *Why did the poet choose them? What effect do they have on the reader?*

4. Structure Matters

- How is the poem organised? (Stanzas, line length, punctuation)
- Does the structure reflect the meaning? (e.g., short lines for tension, enjambment for flow)

5. Write Your Response

- Start with a clear idea: What is the poem about and how does it make you feel?
- Use evidence: Quote short phrases to support your points.
- Explain effects: Why did the poet use that word/image? What does it make the reader think or feel?
- Cover meaning, language, and structure

Tips for Success:

- To succeed in GCSE Maths revision, focus on *practice with past papers*, *targeting weak topics*, and *active recall methods*. Plan short, regular sessions, check answers carefully, and simulate exam conditions to build confidence
- 1. Create a revision timetable
- 2. Complete past paper questions under timed conditions
- 3. Identify weak topics and revise these
- 4. Know which formulae are provided, and memorise those that aren't
- 5. Practice exam techniques
- 6. Ensure time is spent working through multi-step problem-solving questions
- 7. Create flashcards and ask your family and friends to test you
